Looking at Paintings: Subject, Narrative, Composition and Materials

1. Session Description

Held in the impressive Victorian Art Gallery at Leicester Museum & Art Gallery, this session focuses on the broad aspects of 19th Century paintings, such as the importance of narrative, subject matter, composition, and the use of materials.

The session engages pupils in various practical and creative activities, maximising different learning styles to help pupils gain confidence to look at and evaluate a painting.

4. Learning Outcomes

- Develop skills and build confidence to interpret works of art.
- To work co-operatively as a group and individually.
- Contribute through discussion and activities.

5.Curriculum Links

6. Staffing requirements

Museum facilitator led plus at least 3 accompanying adults from the school.

7. Room requirements

Victorian Art Gallery at Leicester Museum & Art Gallery.

8. Pre-visit and Post-visit activities

Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 cross curricular links:

- History: Interpret the past from resources
- Language and literacy: write clearly, accurately, and coherently; handwriting; writing narratives; be competent in speaking and listening, make formal presentations
- Art: use drawing, painting, and sculpture to develop and share ideas and imagination; develop techniques; use a range of materials creatively to design and make products
- > **Drama:** acting, role-play, theatre making

Pre-visit activities

1). Research different kinds of portraiture i.e. self- portraits, group portraits, full length and half-length portraits. Show examples from different times in art history.

2). Create a self-portrait, without looking in a mirror. Discuss perceptions and how they compare to reality.

Post-visit activities

1). Use the portrait of Mrs Matthew Michell and Her Children Matthew and Anne by Thomas Hudson, discussed in the session as inspiration. <u>https://artuk.org/discover/artworks/mrs-matthew-michell-and-her-children-matthew-and-anne-81505</u>

- Re-create the poses in the picture and make a modern- day interpretation, dress in modern clothes with modern accessories and recreate a background relevant to the characters.
- > Write a short story about the characters in Thomas Hudson's painting.

2). Use rulers to measure proportions of a face, the size of features and where they are positioned. Draw a face using the measurements.
