# The Trial of King Richard III

## **1. Session Description**

The Trail of King Richard III session is designed for upper Key Stage 2 and Key Stage 3 pupils. Through a variety of activities, pupils will learn about what happens in the courtroom and find out about how crime and punishment has changed through time. They also will gain an understanding of the use of the Leicester Guildhall as a criminal courtroom, learn how the courts try a case and debate Richard III's kingship and his legal reforms.

#### 3. Session Structure and Breakdown of Timings

## 4. Learning Outcomes

- To state different roles in a courtroom and what that person does.
- To demonstrate an understanding of how the courts try a case.
- Understand the reign of Richard III and express an opinion on whether he was a good or a bad king.
- To be able to describe changes in crime and punishment through time and associate punishments with the correct era.
- Pupils will have experienced handling real artefacts from a museum collection.

## 5. Curriculum Links

## 8. Pre-visit and Post-visit activities

Cross curricular links:

- > **History:** Interpret the past from resources
- Language and literacy: write clearly, accurately, and coherently; handwriting; writing narratives; be competent in speaking and listening, make formal presentations
- Design and Technology: use research and exploration, understand and use the properties of materials and the performance of structural elements to achieve functioning solutions

#### **Pre-visit activities**

1). Research the Leicester Guildhall and find out about its different uses over the centuries.

2). Research and discuss some of the legal reforms King Richard III passed.

#### Post visit activities

1). Make a medieval timber framed model building. Research wattle and daub and create your own version in the model by weaving lolly sticks and cover with papier mache.

2). Discuss if your perceptions of whether King Richard III was a good king, or a bad king have changed since taking part in the session.



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
